After hearing the theme for National History Day 2021 was communication in history, we immediately knew such a broad theme would bring a variety of different ways to approach our project. Since both of us are musicians and particularly like jazz, we quickly knew we wanted to pick a topic that conveyed the relationship between jazz and racial injustice in America. As far as a time period, we settled on the 1950s-60s, when jazz was just starting to peak. Narrowing it down from there proved to be more difficult, as there were many great musicians and activists during this time. However, since both of us play rhythm instruments (drums and bass), we found Max Roach to be an extraordinary option and someone whose role in activism is less well-known than others.

We started our research by gathering an abundance of facts and sources so we would have a solid basis of background knowledge. Additionally, we wanted to ensure that we knew the context of the times, and how the great events of the Civil Rights Movement affected Roach's career. Next, we began focusing our research on how Max Roach chose to communicate the racial prejudice of the era and the struggle of African Americans through his music. We were very excited to discover his "We Insist!" album, which directly addressed racism and discrimination through jazz, and was one of the first records to do so. After listening to the album and the rich meaning held in the lyrics and style of music, we found ways to incorporate it into our project.
